

Funding needs to be split between implementation and curriculum development. Curriculum development is important in terms of quality and efficiency. Quality because we want to develop a curriculum that can enable us to teach the best possible bridging programme. Efficiency because if we are able to produce a comprehensive and adaptable curriculum, when the idea gains broader support, it will spread more efficiently as there will already be a curriculum ready to be adapted and used.

Amplify funding will help us to do (which may largely revolve around scaling up and systematizing/professionalizing the program):

- Expand to every school hosting refugees in Kampala, or at least one school in each sub-division of kampala where refugees stay
- Help compensate some of the costs of volunteers
- Provide students with 'starter packs' for when they enter schools: include the first semester or year of tuition, books, uniforms...
- Help fund total programmatic monitoring and evaluation
- Help fund a workshop for national teachers, refugee mentors, and a select number of parents to sit down and develop a formalized bridging program curriculum and resources pack, using the feedback gained from various pilots; create print and electronic versions of these resources, and have periodic update materials.

Amplify 'design support' could assist with the scaling up and professionalization process.
