In this book there are many new words. It's important to introduce new language during these years. Birth to three are the years that children develop the foundation for further learning. Here are some important tips to help foster your early learners:

- Read the images.
 - When reading the words take the time to stop and evaluate the images. What do you see? What does the child see? How do the words match the images?
- Discuss and ask questions.
 - Ask your child what they think and feel about the story. How does the story relate to you? How do they relate to the story?
 - Ask them what they remember or what was their favorite part.
- Further reading.
 - Build off of the concepts or new words that have been introduced. The best way to truly remember the meaning of the words is through repetition and a change of context.
 - Introduce songs or poetry that include words or concepts that relate to the ones previously read.
- Act it out.
 - When reading along using actions to further illustrate the meaning of the words can make the story more engaging.
